We are starting to see more growth in the Arbors. There are 261 lots in our Development including the Park. There presently are 130 completed houses in the Arbors and 5 other houses under construction in varying stages. Several other lots are currently being cleared. Sabine is now down to only 14 lots left at last count. We have also had 4 houses sell recently within the Arbors. Several homeowners purchased additional lots on either side of their homes to expand their property. All of this activity makes for exciting times here in the Arbors.

The monthly meetings are slowly

growing and we really appreciate the interest and attendance by the folks that can attend. The Board encourages participation of all residents and we look forward to input from everyone. Maintenance Committee Activities

The South gate was severely damaged by a drunk driver in late December of 2005. We recently received the settlement from the driver's insurance company and repairs have begun. Expect the South gate to be restored to its former glory by the end of April 2006.

You should have noticed that several projects have been underway and/or completed in the first quarter of 2006. North gate projects include installation of new commercial grade operators (not the gates, just the operators), repair of the sprinkler system, new landscaping, replacement of landscape lighting fixtures, and re-staining of the three Arbors concrete signs green. In the park we have removed the old and dying trees in the front esplanade and replaced them new live oaks. This was done to eliminate the danger of the dead and rotting trees falling and to freshen the appearance of the park. Additionally, the plants that were blocking the park sign have been removed, new landscaping lights have been installed and new

landscaping will be planted. Future park improvement plans include the removal of all metal flower bed edging, re-landscaping all the beds around the covered porch area, and replacing the crushed granite entry with flagstone.

Currently there are two street signs missing. One rusted and the other was involved in the same drunk-driving incident as the South gates. Other street signs in the Arbors are in various stages of needing repair. We have 8 new street signs which are being painted. It is the plan of the MC to replace the two missing signs first. During the latter part of 2006 and 2007, the MC will gradually replace the worst looking signs with the new ones. The old signs will then be sandblasted, repaired and repainted. The replacement will continue until all the street signs have been replaced or refurbished.

The drainage easements along our roads continue to be a source of concern for everyone here at the Arbors. The MC plans to continue making easement erosion repairs

Outline of Community Review Items

At least once a month the management company, at the direction of the ACC, performs a drive thru of the Arbors. During this drive thru, notes are made regarding the condition of yards and homes and the visibility of items. Additionally, as owners witness issues on property in the Arbors, the ACC is notified.

The following is a list of the items that will generate a reminder, warning and or fine when viewed by drive thru or owner report. This list is a work in progress and will be amended as issues/items arise or clarification is needed. It is designed remind owners that they are responsible for the activity on their lot whether activity is by the owner or a contractor, to support the education goals of the Board and to support approved restrictions and policies of the Improvement Association.

It is the intent of the ACC to provide this information as educational so owners have guidelines to assist with compliance. Items not appearing on this list may generate action, if deemed appropriate by the Board or ACC.

Area reviewed - 'Yard': The area of each lot that extends from the easements on each Arbors street to the established structures or that is viewed from any Arbors street.

Area reviewed - 'Easement': The first fifteen [15] of each lot from any Arbors street which is owned by the Community as a whole, and protected by each owner as custodian of the easement attached to their lot.

The following cannot be visible in any yard or the easement from any Arbors street:

1. Trailers of any kind [utility, cargo, travel, horse, etc]. This includes being visible above/ behind a fence. Review includes the regularity with which the trailer is parked at the residence and if the ACC has been notified of a temporary placement.
2. Boats and/or boat trailers. This includes visible above/behind a fence. Review includes the regularity with which the boat/trailer is parked at the residence and if the ACC has been notified of a temporary placement.
3. Cable or satellite receiver
4. Tree, yard, plant, or branch debris stacked or piled. Fire wood stacks are acceptable if neat and orderly
5. Construction material stacked or piled: bricks, rocks, lumber, packaged concrete, etc.
6. Packaged landscape material stacked or piled: bags of mulch, potting soil, rocks, etc.
7. Temporary or permanent plastic sheeting. Greenhouses are acceptable, with approval of ACC for location and construction material.
8. Construction equipment: ladders, scaffolds, paint cans, power washers, etc.
9. Yard care equipment: mowers, mulchers, chippers, tractors etc.

NOTE: For landscaping and construction equipment and materials, it is understood these items will be visible while being used. However, prolonged visibility of non-utilized materials is not allowed.

Other Items Reviewed:

1. Unapproved construction-buildings, additions, and alterations
2. Unapproved or inappropriate mailboxes and fencing [functional or decorative]
3. Easement damage from improper usage or alteration, improper easement repair
4. Conditions of buildings, fences, gazebos, and any other constructed items that must be keep in good repair, appropriately painted etc.
5. Condition of yard maintenance: downed trees, dead trees/plants, weeds in planted lawns, overgrown grass, etc
6. Overall neatness of any items visible. Examples: stacks of buckets, ice chests, empty plant containers or other items stacked or piled in a yard or driveway, on a patio or deck, additional trash containers, compost bins etc.


Board approved policies are also considered during community review. These policies include but are not limited to:

1. Utility Unit Policy
2. Large Animal Policy

Notices and Actions Process: When an item is noted, a ‘friendly reminder’ is sent to the owner. If the item has been corrected, no further actions are required. If the item has not been corrected, but soon will be, a simple call or e-mail to Pioneer or an e-mail to the ACC is sufficient, and no further action is required. The friendly reminder states the issues[s] must be corrected within 25 days. Contact with Pioneer or the ACC does not extend any deadlines or action requirements. Requests for time extensions on violation items can be requested in writing and submitted to Pioneer.

If an item is not corrected, it will be noted again on the next drive thru. A second notice is sent to the owner. The second notice is called a Warning Letter and is more strongly worded. Once again, if the item has been corrected, no further action is required. If the item has not been corrected, but soon will be [within the 14 days allowed], a simple call or e-mail to Pioneer will be sufficient, and no further action is required. Contact with the Pioneer or the ACC does not extend any deadlines or action requirements. Requests for time extensions on violation items can be requested in writing and submitted to the Pioneer or the ACC.

If an item is not corrected after the warning notice 14 day time frame, a fine is assessed. The owner will receive an invoice letter that displays a fine is owed. If the fine is not paid, the owner will also receive a statement that displays the fine. This takes place at least 39 days from the first reminder letter. If the item is not corrected, another fine is issued and a fine letter is sent. The only way to prevent additional fines is to correct the issue. Failure to comply may result in additional fines and AIA actions. Arbors drive thrus occur at least once a month.

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throughout the year. Please remember to ask your guests not to park on the grass in the easements. If you see anyone parking there, please ask them to park on the street. If you have any contractors working on your property, make sure that they know not to drive across or park in the easements. Last year the Association spent almost \$20,000 to repair the erosion in the easements. Once the grass is disturbed by car or trailer tires, it can take over a year to grow back.
