Tour participants will be transported around the facility with stops at a live fire exercise, barracks and armory tour. Movement within Camp Swift will be on vehicles furnished by Camp Swift.

## Fire Danger High

Bastrop County Commissioners lifted the BURN BAN a few weeks ago.

Although the Arbors received as much as 5" of rain just before the Burn Ban was lifted, that is not near enough to alleviate the fire danger we face living here in the forest, especially with low humidity, high winds, and afternoon heating.

If you plan to burn debris, please take a few moments to review the Elgin Volunteer Fire Department's rules regarding burning outside. These are posted on the Arbors website: <http://www.arborsia.org/index1.htm>

Windy conditions are a definite no-no for burning. Fires can be intensified, will get out of control very quickly... and a garden hose is no match for a brush fire!

Don't burn debris if there is any other way to dispose of it. Tree and branch chippers aren't that expensive to rent if you have a sizeable amount of wood to be chipped. Recycling back to Nature is the best way to go. Remember, keeping the Arbors safe from fire is every resident's responsibility.

## Burglary Prevention Checklist

We have a Neighborhood Watch program here in the Arbors. Neighbors working together make one of the best crime-fighting teams around.

Here are some more tips to think about:

Keep shrubbery trimmed. Tall, thick shrubbery provides cover for a burglar and lets them work undetected.

Keep the area around your house well lit. Motion activated outdoor floodlights work especially well.

Using an engraving pen, write your Driver's License number on your personal property.

Make sure your exterior door locks are the "1" long throw" deadbolt style. Make sure the "security plate" is installed in the door jamb to complement the deadbolt lock. Keep your windows locked as well. Most burglars won't break a secured window for fear of the noise and attention it would attract.

Make a home inventory list,

complete with photos or video. Store this away from your home in case of fire or storm damage.

Never leave a house key in such obvious places as a mailbox or under a doormat.

Have a security plan for when you are on vacation. Ask a neighbor or friend to pick up mail, newspapers, etc. Better yet, have your mail held at the post office till you return.

Use automatic timers to turn on lights, radios and televisions. An especially effective method is to have one time turn off a bathroom light as one time turns on a bedroom light and vice versa, to give an impression of movement within the house. Change these sequences at least every three months.


Have a "wide angle" peephole in your exterior doors. This gives you a panoramic view of the area around your door.

Report all suspicious activity to the Bastrop County Sheriff's Department immediately.

## Extension Agent Visits

This past March we were visited by the County Agricultural Extension Agent for Bastrop County, Rachel Bower. She came to look at our trees, primarily to look for oak wilt. The good news is the oaks here are not dying from oak wilt. The bad news is they are suffering from another fungus, hypoxylon canker, which attacks stressed trees of several varieties. This

fungus attacks hardwood trees that have been damaged or weakened by the stress of drought. There is no "cure" but it is difficult for the fungus to develop in living wood that has a normal moisture content so watering valued trees regularly during times of drought is a positive step.
